There are nine pubs around Chapeltown/Burncross... (one of which is a bit of a hike). Can you work them out from the clues below? You will not see them in the same order as the clues. (One of the clues is pretty obscure and is likely to need a Wikipedia hint.)

Start on the Arundel Road end of Station Road. Have a good look round. What can you see?

Walk down Station Road to the roundabout. Turn right.

Take the first exit from Loundside roundabout, onto Burncross Road. It's just over a mile to the furthest away pub on this list.

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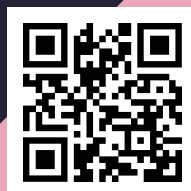

THE CHAPELTOWN TRAIL

Walk around the village following the directions, read the clues and see how many questions you can answer.

Where possible, the walk will take you across pedestrian crossings. Where this is not possible, please do take care, as some of the roads are very busy.

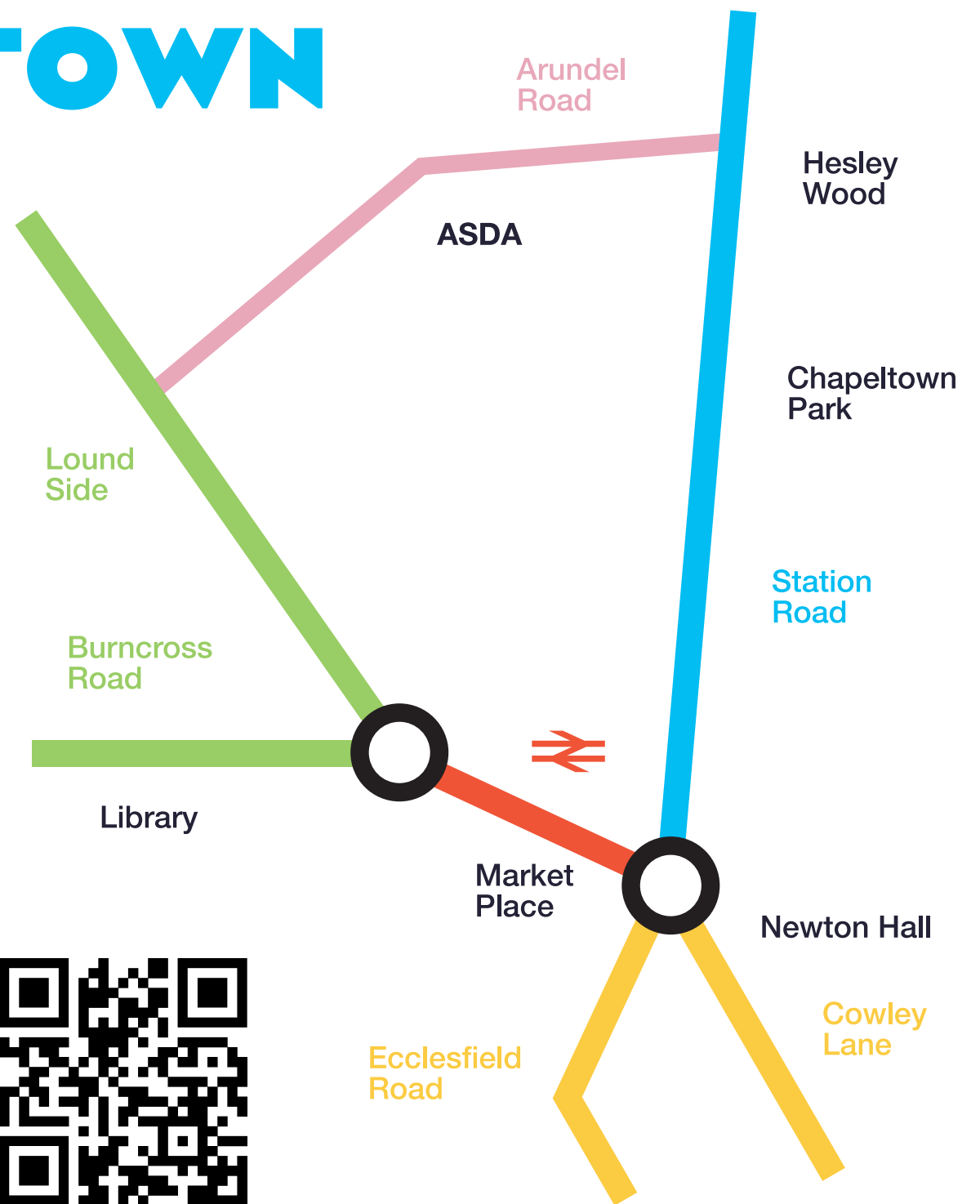
The walk starts at the level access exit from Chapeltown station, where Arundel Road joins Sussex Road.

Walk down Arundel Road, crossing the entrance to Asda car park. Cross Arundel Road. Turn left at the end of Arundel Road, onto Station Road.

Cross Station Road away from the junction with Arundel Road, where it is a bit quieter. Pass the car dealership on your right.

Just past the dealership, follow the public footpath sign into the park.

As you enter the park, on the right of the path, you will see the first of several sculptures by Hilary Cartmel.



1 What was falling from trees?

Continue along the path, further into the park. Look for another sculpture.

2 What are blackberries like?

At the fork in the path by the Freeride Area, take the right hand path.

3 Where does the sun brightly shine?

Turn left at the next fork in the path, up the hill. There is a bench at the top of the hill, and another sculpture to discover.

4 What would you do on this bench?

Turn round and walk back down the hill, take the next left, walking past the band stand. At the next fork, turn left to go and look at the covid memorial. Turn around and walk down the hill, towards the children's playground. Walk around the bottom edge of the playground, around to the left.

5 What colours are the swaying trees?

If you want to go and look at the war memorial, turn left at the next fork, then come back down to the corner of the playground. Walk down the slope to Cowley Lane.

Walk towards the centre of Chapeltown. You will see Thomas Chambers Newton Memorial Hall on the right. Newton, Chambers & Co. was one of England's largest industrial companies, founded in 1789 by George Newton and Thomas Chambers. Turn right towards the garden.

6 Who are the garden and shelter dedicated to?

Take a break and spend some time to look around this lovely garden.

7 What is another name for an anvil block?

From the garden, you could turn right at the roundabout to explore the many independent shops and cafes along Station Road.

For level access back to the starting point at the station, go along Station Road. The shortest route back to the start is up the steps by the railway bridge.

From the garden, cross towards the Wagon and Horses. Continue under the railway bridge.

Use the pedestrian crossing, over to the market place. Turn right, past the petrol station, onto Burncross Road.

Look for the information board outside the library.

Children used to be able to work in mines from the age of five or six. The Mines and Collieries Act of 1842 prohibited children under the age of ten from working underground.

8 What was the name of the 13-year-old boy who worked as a 'hurrier' at Chapeltown?

Use the zebra crossing to cross Burncross Road. Continue away from the centre of Chapeltown.

Foys Solicitors is in the site of the Greenhead Almshouses. There were six houses either side of a central communal room, which served as a reading room and chapel.

9 What year were the almshouses built?

Continue up Burncross Road. Look for a turning on the right into Housley Lane, an unadopted road. Walk up Housley Lane.

Look out for Housley Hall on the right.

10 What year was Housley Hall built?

Continue up Housley Lane. Follow the road round to the right, onto Housley Park.

Just before the church, look out for the fairy garden on the left.

Go through the gate into the graveyard. Look at the gravestones to the right of the path. They are facing away from you, so you will need to watch out for this clue.

11 Who met his untimely end playing football on Valentines Day 1892?

Continue through the graveyard, out of the gates and onto Lound Side. Turn right. Cross over, then take the second left onto Sussex Road.

Follow Sussex Road round, to where it joins Arundel Road and then go to the Remembrance garden.

12 What date was the remembrance stone dedicated?

Cross the road carefully, as it's a busy corner and end the walk back where you started it, at Chapeltown Station.
